What have we seen so far with Year 1 projects?



PROJECT DEVELOPMENT PROCESS

- 43 projects identified across 8 organizations
- 94 steps advanced
 - We only anticipated 50 steps from Year 1 projects!
- Median start step of 2 (Problem Identification) -> Median step of 5 (Grant Writing) in July 2023

What have we seen so far with Year 1 projects? Additional outcomes

Leveraged ~\$1.5 million (SNEP SWIG, MVP Program, US Economic Dev. Administration, Mass CZM)

Facilitated eight new staff hires

Coordination among recipients for technical expertise Built administrative capacity to seek and accept federal funds

What have we seen so far with Year 1 projects? Lessons learned for NBEP

NBEP intentionally did not dictate to recipients how many projects they should tackle with Year 1 funding. Some reported on one, some on 27.

For BIL Years 2-5, NBEP plans to work with recipients to find ways to streamline reporting while focusing on priority metrics and advancing the most promising projects.

Plan to request that partners focus on advancing a handful of their most promising projects to mid-arrow (steps 6-8: study/assessment to design).






Maps for Save the Bay Aquarium


